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# Amplify – First Stage's BIPOC Virtual Short Play Series kicks off with

# **COPPER HORNS IN WATER**

-Virtual production developed in partnership with Indian Community School-

Milwaukee, WI – April 7, 2021 – First Stage will kick off its inaugural Amplify – BIPOC Virtual Short Plays Series with COPPER HORNS IN WATER by Ty Defoe, writer, interdisciplinary artist, First Stage alum and ICS alumni, and directed by Johamy Morales, Director of Education at Seattle Children's Theatre and Trustee for Theatre Communication Group (TCG). Based on Anishinaabe storytelling traditions, this is a story about North, a curious underwater creature who is unsure they are ready for their Copper Horns. North soon learns the importance of their horns when they need to summon their strength – and with the collective power of their friends – to save the day. COPPER HORNS IN WATER, featuring 12 students from Indian Community School and actress and ICS alumni Marisa Carr, is a fun-filled story for the entire family. Recommended for families with young people ages 8+. Approximate running time is 15 minutes.

First Stage developed this new series to offer virtual short plays created by Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC) playwrights that center on the young person's point or view, amplifying the voices of these artists and young people throughout the Milwaukee community. The organization has had a long history of age-appropriate casting and of centering its work on the young person's point of view. Understanding the power of connection that young people feel when they see themselves and their stories on stage, First Stage is excited to begin this series featuring newly commissioned work from BIPOC playwrights and directors.

COPPER HORNS IN WATER streams **April 16 – May 16, 2021.** Each play in the AMPLIFY series will be available on the First Stage YouTube channel. Audience members are encouraged to register to receive the link to each play prior to its premiere. Ty Defoe (Giizhig) (Playwright), is from the Oneida and Ojibwe Nations. He is a Grammy Awardwinning composer, playwright, librettist, interdisciplinary artist, actor, choreographer, eagle and hoop dancer. Ty interweaves artistic projects with social justice, indigeneity, trans rights, Indigi-Queering and environmentalism. Ty's international arts highlights: the Millennium celebration in Cairo, Egypt; International Music Festival in Ankara, Turkey and Festival of World Cultures in Dubai. Awards, residencies and fellowships: TransLab Fellow, Global Indigenous Heritage Festival Award, Robert Rauschenberg Artist in Residence, Jonathan Larson Award, Cordillera International Film Festival Finalist, 2021 Cultural Capital Fellow, Eugene O'Neill Theater Center finalist and the ASCAP Musical Theater Workshop. Johamy Morales (Director) (she/her) has over eighteen years of experience in education, directing, community engagement, new work development and working in the performing arts. Johamy currently serves as the Director of Education at Seattle Children's Theatre (SCT) and as a Trustee for Theatre Communication Group (TCG). In addition she has served as an advisory council for the Colorado Creative Industries, Reimagine: New Plays in TYA, TCG's Rising Leaders of Color and TCG's Education Conference. Prior to working with SCT, Johamy served as the Education Director for Creede Repertory Theatre in Creede, Colorado and directed the Comparative Arts Department and the Junior Musical Theatre Program at Interlochen Center for the Arts in Interlochen, Michigan. Johamy has worked with Arena Stage and La Jolla Playhouse through their education programs as a teaching artist. Johamy is an alumnus of the Allen Lee Hughes Fellowship at Arena Stage and the British American Drama Academy in Oxford, England, where she studied Contemporary & Classical works. Johanny toured with the cast of New World Jukebox where she performed in the 2006 Grahamstown National Arts Festival, in Grahamstown, South Africa and with San Diego State University in, Carnaval de Calaveras, with performances in Oaxaca, Veracruz and Mexico D.F. in 2004. In February of 2017, Johamy collaborated with the US State Department, the US Embassy & Consulate and several NGO's to promote awareness of domestic and gender violence in Kolkata and Ranchi, India. As an educator, artist and director Johamy has worked with various schools and nonprofit organizations both nationally and internationally including Theatre for Young Audiences/USA, American Alliance for Education & Theatre, Write Now: TYA New Work Festival by Child's Play, First Stage, Hope College, Fort Lewis College, University of San Diego, Esperanza Charter School, Wexner Center, Dennos Museum, Students in Transition Empowerment Program and Columbus Refugee & Immigration Services. Johamy Morales holds an MFA in acting from The Ohio State University, with a specialization in outreach and devising new work, and a BA in Theatre from San Diego State University.

**Jeff Frank (Artistic Director)** is recognized as one of the top directors in the field with an expertise in developing new work for theater for young audiences. He holds a BFA in Theater from the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and an MFA in Child Drama from the University of Utah. Having served as First Stage's Education and Academy Director from 1996 – 2003 and as First Stage's Artistic Director since February 2003, Jeff remains committed to the power of theater to transform lives and is forever thankful to call First Stage home.
